Our University Network

As all of you remember, a network of universities that have a common interest in Communication for Social Change was created during the seminar held in Los Baños (The Philippines) in September 2005, organised by the Communication for Social Change Consortium and hosted by the College of Development Communication (UPLB). Twelve universities participated in the meeting and agreed on a statement that underlines the purpose of helping "to spread the principles of communication for social change and development, provide mutual support among existing programs, and legitimate the work of these programs in both academic and practitioner communities". Organising, researching and exchanging will be the three main levels of interaction within the network.

New members

Manuel Chaparro and Francisco Sierra, from the **University of Sevilla** and **University of Malaga**, in Spain, could not attend the seminar at Los Baños, however, they have expressed their desire to be part of the network, so we have invited both to join, as well as Alejandro Barranquero, a PhD student. We also invited Peter Taylor, Andrew Deak and Jethro Pettit to join the network, representing the **Institute of Development Studies** (IDS) in Sussex (UK), because we consider that the research and practical work they are doing in relation to knowledge and participatory development is strictly related to communication for social change. Other individuals teaching in various universities have also expressed their desire to join the network.

Universidad del Norte, Barranquilla

The CFSC Consortium has been relating with Universidad del Norte in Barranquilla (Colombia), for a number of years. We have supported their initiative to create a new Master degree with emphasis in Communication for Social Change and a strong component of participatory action research. The creation of the Master degree is now on the final stages. The Universidad del Norte is one of the four universities with the accreditation of "excellence" in Colombia. The process of obtaining the accreditation for the new Master degree in Communication, Culture and Social Change has followed all the steps established by the Colombian legislation. The last step was the visit by a delegation from the National Council of Acreditation of the ICFES (Instituto Colombiano para el Fomento de la Educación Superior) to evaluate the conditions for the Master degree so far. The mission was successful and we expect the Master degree to start during 2006.

A Memorandum of Understanding is currently being prepared between Ohio University and Universidad del Norte in line with the recommendations that came out from the seminar in Los Baños. According to Rafael, "*the MOU will include collaboration on faculty and student exchanges, research, publications, and training, among other activities*". Already, an agreement has been reached with UNINORTE so Rafael Obregón can spend three months of the year, between June and August, "providing support in several areas, particularly to the MA program".
